



Surrendered 2024 clay, glaze, digital media

Artist Statement

Influenced by the work of ceramicist, Lia Bagrationi, *Surrendered* explores how spirituality shapes our identity. Clay begins as a formless mass, full of potential but lacking structure. As the potter's hands apply pressure, the clay begins to take form, refining us into something new. These hollow, imperfect pots, adorned only with a white underglaze, represent purification and spiritual immersion. It is this process of thrown clay, marked by tension and transformation, that reveals the important role of the Holy Spirit.

Artist Statement

Artist Statement

Joint conflict captures symbolic windows into the journey of twins' strength in connectiveness and individuality. In contrast to the societal stereotypes placed upon twins, my work explores the personal journey of my brother and I as young, emerging visual artists. The stylistic and expressive brushstrokes emit a personal and contemporary context of real moments in time. Through symbolism, the audience can visually witness the disadvantages of separation on the creative spirit and the positive effects of togetherness.

Artist Statement

Conveying a rich personal context, the underlying, blurred theme throughout the series mimics the various degrees of clarity I experience with my vision as a result of a chronic condition called Myasthenia gravis. The deterioration of one's vision impacts both the physical and psychological way in which we, as humans, view the world and can be both enlightening and obscuring. By merging the boundaries between clarity and obscurity, *Perception* fosters an enquiry into the subjective nature of vision.

Flightless birds 2024 wire

Artist Statement

noun: solitude 1. the state or situation of being alone. In my work, I explore feelings of self-imposed isolation, focusing on the human capacity to be both the prison and prisoner of our minds. Here, wire birds hang eerily in an imitation of life— frozen in a stasis of suspended flight. They appear delicate yet dangerous, as their wings fray into jagged barbs, leaving you wondering if they were ever truly flying or simply caught in a perpetual free-fall.



Charlotte Hinze

Shattered refuge 2024

natural fibres, wax, paper

Artist Statement

Shattered refuge delves into how artists embed personal experiences in sculptures. This threepiece work captures the devastation of the 2023 December tornado, using natural materials like sticks, string, rust and wood to portray the chaos and fragility of the aftermath. Wax and magazine figures represent the community's suffering within their destroyed homes. The intertwined materials symbolise resilience and vulnerability, evoking empathy and awareness of nature's power while honouring the human spirit's resilience in the face of disasters.



Cindy Peng

Submerging 2024

synthetic polymer paint on canvas

Artist Statement

Submerging captures natural light in water across different times of day, aiming to produce realistic effects and the feeling of light. It manipulates techniques from artists Erin Hanson and Chris Wood, combined with knowledge from experiments on light behaviour in water. I've underpainted in red and layered acrylic and oil paint. While considering formal techniques, I created an artwork that captures both the realistic aspect and the feeling of how light reflects and catches in the flow of water.



Claire Badenoch

Tactile conversations 2024

ceramic, timber, audio

Artist Statement

Tactile conversations explores a dialogue between human presence and a ceramic organism, urging viewers to contemplate societal constraints on nature. The blood-red gloss and bulbous shapes suggest both inviting tactility and a visceral connection to a mysterious creature. Muffled heartbeat sounds enhance the sense of a living organism, fostering an emotional relationship. Its slumped position against the stool reflects nature's forced conformity, while an adjacent stool invites interaction and silent conversation with the outcasted creature.



Jamal Galanopoulos

Fight or flight 2024

cane, tissue paper mâché, twine wire, natural sticks and steel rod set in plaster

Artist Statement

Fight or flight is a mixed media installation that embodies the concept of living, yet dead birds. Each represents the impact of climate change on our wildlife. Their burnt and decayed bodies balance on elongated legs set in plaster, to boldly express being held captive. Despite their condition, animals naturally adapt to their surroundings. The dominant bird stands in a human-like pose to protest and protect the right to live and co-exist in our decaying world.



Julia Vallance

Not so blue 2024

digital media, cyanotype on fabric

Artist Statement

Not so blue responds to the concept of 'chance art'. Influenced by Hans Arp's, Untitled (Collage with Squares Arranged according to the Laws of Chance) 1916-17, the random placement of objects onto light-sensitive fabric pays homage to Arp's 'lack of conscious control'. This historical process allows nature to 'take its course'. The addition of water and sprayed household chemicals interferes with the photogram process, challenging the viewer to speculate on the effects of chance upon us all.

Artist Statement

As ageing changes the body, it greatly changes the soul. I am fascinated by the way people construct maps of their lives through tattoos. A statement of our values, our interests and our personal growth. A celebration of how we honour the people we once were and the change we undergo. The image of tattoos on ageing skin demonstrates that by accepting every stage of our lives, we become the best version of ourselves. Unapologetically accepting who we are.



Martha Moorhead

All that glisters... 2024

plaster, concrete, gold leaf, digital print

Artist Statement

All that glisters... promotes the idea that appearances can be deceptive. Concrete and plaster, typically seen as mundane, are manipulated to appear luxurious. Techniques used create different interpretations of materials, with gold leaf elevating the draped cloth to symbolise opulence. Modern technologies reconceptualise traditional vanitas (still life) art practices. The work alludes to Shakespeare's quote, "All that glisters is not gold", highlighting themes of deception. Examining the back of the sculpture, reveals the true nature of the work, emphasising the inherent message.

Artist Statement

Identity is a tricky aspect of life to understand. It is intricately constructed from many different facets of the human experience, but that's not the problem. The problem is that we are simply incapable of deciding what these experiences make us. Traditionally, a key part of identity stems from the stimulation surrounding us. My major work explores what it means to be a product of the world around you.

Artist Statement

Reverence is a tribute to women that invites the audience to celebrate the unappreciated, divine feminine, rather than the more commonly exhibited masculine archetypes. By gathering divine women across a range of cultures, my work fosters a universal message of how women may overcome adversity. Reverence features Greek goddess Artemis, Kaguya-hime from Japanese folklore and Mother Mary. These women face many struggles and sacrifices, yet they triumph as guiding, powerful figures who are admired by many.

Artist Statement

Looking for Atlantis expresses mankind's obsessive desire for discovery; our greed for conquering the unknown. Artist Statement

As an immigrant experiencing culture shock after moving to Australia, I was inspired to explore this feeling through digital media. Repetition of black and white backgrounds surrounding various figures represents feelings of displacement. Text on the figures' blank faces label their identities, while also removing their individual personalities. Coloured forms are juxtaposed against black and white backgrounds to show each figure's desire to go back to where they belong. I invite my audience to experience the homesickness of my lonely figures.

Artist Statement

Signed, sealed is a reflection of the intricate overlap of social and personal identity. The piece employs rich cultural symbolism to explore feelings of deep-rooted dissonance. My Chinese heritage informs the way that others tend to perceive my identity, with my cultural background taking precedence over other aspects. The subject panders to the audience's prevailing perspectives on minority identities. Yet, sealed behind the label attributed to her, the subject's gaze follows the viewer - challenging them to see beyond the surface.



Ruby Neilsen

Maligned foundation 2024

synthetic polymer paint, cut paper on canvas

Artist Statement

Maligned foundation parallels the imperative role of insects within our ecosystems to the complex workings of a house. The insect pattern, inspired by vintage wallpaper designs, provides decoration while veiling essential systems. This design mirrors insects' roles within ecosystems, as they are evaluated solely on presentation; attractive butterflies are worshipped, while eerie centipedes are maligned. Small insects break free of the pattern, rejecting maligned reputations and urging viewers to acknowledge their foundational role in both natural and urban environments.



Secret Goetz

Safety is our #1 priority 2024 digital print, natural fibres, wire

Artist Statement

Safety is our #1 priority is a digitally rendered drawing that draws inspiration from traditional propaganda - the works of Shepard Fairey and the Guerilla Girls - to depict how often our freedom of expression and individuality is suppressed by governmental restraints. The piece draws from Orwellian concepts of authoritarian control and surveillance, as well as naturalistic themes linking not only to eco-anarchism but how society often reflects the brutality of nature despite its advancements.



Sierra Cooper

The death list 2024

calico, cotton thread, pins

Artist Statement

The death list raises awareness of sweatshops honouring the victims of the Rana Plaza collapse in 2013. I've hand-stitched and sketched 800 name tags, each representing a victim of the Plaza, to memorialise them. The transition from handstitched to sketched to blank tags symbolises the fading memory of these lives, reflecting Western society's tendency to forget. The artwork serves as a tribute and a reminder of the ongoing issue of unsustainable labour practices.

Sophie Pead

Depressed feelings 2024 oil pastel, paint on paper

Artist Statement

Mental illnesses, such as depression, have always consumed the minds of humanity. Depression can have fatal consequences, taking over someone's existence and distorting their perception of the world. Through personal context, my artwork explores how depression has distorted my own perception. To incorporate contemporary context, a painted QR code directs viewers to the Australian Lifeline website. Each page features the same protagonist with a different expression of the feeling of depression, using a cold colour palette to convey the disparity.






Teagan McAuliffe

How does it feel to make art on the Gold Coast?



Favourite artist and why?





What inspires and influences you?


I love the visual nature of the world, landscapes, flowers and especially architecture. I'm always inspired when I go travelling – taking photographs of environments and the ocean.

Favourite artist and why?


My favourite artist is Salvador Dali because he explores subconscious imagery and challenges typical views about life. He reminds me that sometimes it's just not that deep.
